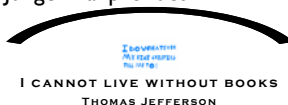

What are the Big 6 Research Strategies and Resources?

1. Task Definition: What information will you need to answer your questions
2. Information Seeking Strategies: How will you select the best resources
3. Locate and Access: Locate sources
4. Use of Information: read information. Find relevant facts from sources
5. Synthesis: organize information from different sources, publish paper, create presentation, etc.
6. Evaluation: Judge final product

Primary Resources are:

first hand accounts—examine for bias

EXAMPLES:

- private diaries, autobiographies
- photograph
- laws
- music
- interviews with persons directly involve
- contracts
- report written by an eyewitness of an event; for example, newspaper articles describing that day or previous day's events, "contemporary" accounts
- results of an experiment or a poll
- documents directly relevant to an event or issue
- artifacts--tools, clothing, furniture, buildings, etc.
- letters
- speeches
