In this packet are 22 pieces of legislation for use during preliminary sessions and 6 pieces of legislation for use in a Super Congress. If not Super Congress is held, these pieces may be incorporated into the regular sessions at the discretion of the Tournament Director.

A Bill Regarding School Sports

1. Be it enacted by this Student Congress here assembled that:
2. **Section 1.** In an effort to combat obesity, social awkwardness, stress caused suicides
3. and crimes, and to help students feel good about themselves, make new friends and give
4. the student an opportunity to find out what he/she is good at, all students enrolled in
5. public or private school must participate fully in at least one season of an approved sport
6. per year.
7. **Section 2.** Definition- Sport: an athletic activity requiring skill or physical prowess
8. **Section 3.** If a student is physically unable to perform ANY sports offered,
9. s/he will be required to do an alternate pre-approved activity fostering social and/or
10. mental involvement.
11. **Section 4.** The provisions of this Bill will start with the next school year, being 2010-
2011.

A Bill Mandating Parent Licensing

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED that a government-run program issuing licenses to
2. potential parents be established in the state of Washington.

4 **Section 1:** Qualification:

5 A) Applicants must register to be licensed within 60 days of the birth of their first child.

6 B) Applicants will be charged a \$45 registration fee to establish themselves in the program. Thereafter, a \$25
7. annual renewal fee will be applied.

8 C) Applicants will be required to participate in a two-week parenting course which includes
9 instruction in basic childcare and personal finance.

10 D) After completion of the course, applicants will be issued a license by the state certifying that
11. they are qualified parents.

12 E) In situations of shared custody, only one parent or guardian is required to obtain a license.

13 **Section 2:** Enforcement:

14 A) A \$500 fine will imposed upon those failing to register for a license within 60 days of the
15. birth of their child.

16 B) A \$150 annual fine will be imposed for every year thereafter in which the parent(s) fails to
17 register for a license.

18 C) Social Security, hospital, and public school records will be employed in order to detect
19. violations.

20 D) This program shall be under the jurisdiction of the Washington State Department of Social
21. and Health Services.

22 **Section 3:** Funding: Revenue from fines and registration/renewal fees will be directed toward the
23 funding of this program.

24 **Section 4:** Promulgation: This program shall be established and the law enacted within one year of the
25 passage of this legislation.

5. Section 3: Distribution of funds will be overseen by the Department of Education.
6. Section 4: These funds must be utilized to provide a minimum of 3,300 new teachers.
7. Section 5: Funding for this expansion shall come from cutting the following programs currently
8. managed by the Department of Education: BJ Stupak Olympic Scholarships, Close Up
9. Fellowships, Comprehensive School Reform, Education for Native Hawaiians, Even
10. Start, Exchanges with Historic Whaling and Trading Partners, Projects with Industry,
11. Ready to Teach, School Leadership, Strengthening Alaskan Native and Native
12. Hawaiian-Serving Institutions. This will result in a budget of \$169,300,000.
13. Section 6: This bill shall go into effect on June 1st, 2010.

A Bill to Legalize the Growth and Sale of Marijuana

- 15.Section 4 All other “State” and regulatory laws in conflict with this may still be decided and
16. changed by the respective “States”

A Bill to Enforce HIV Tests for All Expecting Mothers

1. BE IT ENACTED by the Student Congress assembled that:
2. SECTION I: All expecting mothers be required by law to be tested for Human
3. Immunodeficiency Virus, or HIV, after testing positively for pregnancy.
4. SECTION II: All women who are pregnant, no matter what age, will be required by law to take an HIV
5. test within the first 3 months of pregnancy. These tests will be given by a certified medical examiner
6. or through an outpatient program certified 7. by the American Medical Association.
7. SECTION III: Expenses of the HIV tests will be absorbed by the expecting mother's medical insurance
8. company. If no medical insurance is apparent then the test expenses will need to be paid out-of-
9. pocket within two years of test date.
10. SECTION IV: Testing procedures and payments for the mandatory HIV tests will be enforced by the
11. American Medical Association with the assistance of local law enforcement agencies.
12. SECTION V: This bill will become effective immediately upon passage.

7. a person in need of assistance after a medical episode or accident; now, therefore,
8. be it
9. **RESOLVED**, by the student congress here assembled that, all states in America
10. be required to instate and enforce the good Samaritan laws.

SUPER CONGRESS LEGISLATION ONLY

The following six pieces of legislation have been reserved for Super Congress at Tournaments where a Super Congress is held. Tournament directors may designate this legislation for preliminary sessions ONLY if no super congress will be held.

Be It Enacted by the Student Congress Here assembled that:

1. Section 1: Washington state law permits Brothels to be owned and operated
2. within the state, so long as they adhere to the rules and regulations listed in
3. Section 2 of this bill.
4. Section 2: Brothels (prostitution house) must be licensed by the state and pay a
5. \$25,000 yearly licensing fee in order to operate. All prostitutes must be 18
6. years of age, a legal resident of the USA and licensed by the state in order to
7. work and must have their business licenses on them at all time while working.
8. Weekly physicals and STD (both blood and cervical swab) checks are
9. mandatory for all licensed prostitutes. Condoms are mandatory for all sexual
10. acts performed. If a worker test positive for HIV or AIDS while employed that
11. workers license is permanently revoked by the state. All sexual acts must be
12. dual consent. A \$250,000 fine shall be issued to any company with a minor
13. found working. The company's business license shall also be suspended for 5
14. years upon conviction. Workers may not be held against their will. There shall
15. be a 10% tax, on all paid acts, that goes directly to the state. Brothels may not
16. be within 1 mile of city or state parks, schools, or daycare centers.
17. Section 3: This bill will be enforced by the Washington State Department of
18. Health (DOH) unless immediate or direct intervention is needed, in which it
19. will be enforced on a city basis (ie city police).
20. Section 4: This bill goes into effect June 1st, 2010.
21. Section 5: All laws that conflict with the legalization of state licensed
22. brothels are null and void as of June 1st, 2010

A Bill To Amend Washington's Rape Laws To Include The Crime Of Date Rape

1. Be it enacted by the student congress assembled here that:
2. Section 1. RCW 9A.44.040 Rape in the first degree shall hereby be amended to
3. add the following language:
4. (e) Commits date rape:
5. (1) Date rape shall consist of sexual intercourse with
6. someone with whom the perpetrator has a personal
7. relationship and uses such relationship to foster
8. sexual intercourse over the objection of, and against the
9. will of, the victim.
10. This bill shall become effective on the first day of July 2010.

RCW 9A.44.040

Rape in the first degree.

(1) A person is guilty of rape in the first degree when such person engages in sexual intercourse with another person by forcible compulsion where the perpetrator or an accessory:

(a) Uses or threatens to use a deadly weapon or what appears to be a deadly weapon; or

(b) Kidnaps the victim; or

(c) Inflicts serious physical injury, including but not limited to physical injury which renders the victim unconscious; or

(d) Feloniously enters into the building or vehicle where the victim is situated.

(2) Rape in the first degree is a class A felony.

A Resolution to Prevent Overly-Intrusive Airport Surveillance

1. WHEREAS: The fourth amendment readily defines the right to undergo a search or procedure as
2. requiring oath or affirmation based on probable cause; and,
3. WHEREAS: The perpetuation of this principle relies solely on the Federal government respecting an
4. individuals right to privacy unless probable cause dictates them to do otherwise; and,
5. WHEREAS: The FBI and CIA have acquired the power to unjustly monitor the intimate privacy of
6. individuals on the account of any relevant or irrelevant basis regardless of Americans'
7. aforementioned natural rights to privacy; and
8. WHEREAS: Current FBI surveillance policies and regulations cause citizens of Middle Eastern descent
9. to be interrupted and searched in the airport 70% more often than any other ethnic group; and,
10. WHEREAS: This interruption is cumbersome on airport facilities, air traffic, and standard airport
11. operating procedures; and,
12. WHEREAS: Treating any racial group in a different, especially negative way for reasons relying
13. merely on the basis of their ethnicity is defined as a racist action, therefore based upon pride
14. and prejudice rather than common sense and logic; therefore,
15. BE IT RESOLVED by this Student Congress assembled that: The United States of America will aim to
16. reform airport scanning policies within one year of this bills passing, removing "ethnicity" from
17. the list of reasons that provide probable cause for a search or seizure to be legally conducted.

A Bill to Augment Concealed Weapons Permits

1. SECTION 1. Current Concealed Weapons Permits (CWPs) will be augmented to allow
2. qualified individuals to carry weapons in the United States on the campus of a publicly
3. funded institute of higher education.
4. SECTION 2. CWPs are void in courthouse, juvenile and adult correctional facilities,
5. prisons, jails, and primary and secondary schools. CWPs are to be held applicable in
6. institutes of higher education.
7. SECTION 3. Those holding a concealed weapon on private grounds must leave if
8. requested, or face charges of trespassing.
9. SECTION 4. The local state police force will be in charge of issuing CWPs to all who are
10. fully qualified. Qualifications include:
 11. A. Eighteen (18) years of age.
 12. B. Legal resident of the United States
 13. C. Background check free of any misdemeanor or felony convictions
 14. D. Drug test free of illegal substances
 15. E. Successful completion of a police firearm training and safety course.
16. SECTION 5. CWPs must be renewed every two years
17. SECTION 6. This bill affects the law in only those states which currently have CWPs
18. SECTION 7. The augmentation will be effective June 1, 2010.
19. SECTION 8. All laws in conflict or competing with this legislation are hereby declared
20. null and void.

2. Section 1. In the case of an economic recession or depression in the United States of
3. America, only people with major mental or physical illnesses be eligible for welfare.
4. Section 2. People who lose their job, and do not voluntarily quit will be eligible for
5. welfare for a period of two (2) months.
6. Section 3. Any organization found in violation will have all government funding
7. stopped until they can provide proof that they no longer fund people who do not meet
8. requirements.
9. Section 4. On the local level, State Police will insure that the organizations that provide
10. welfare are in compliance with the above. No extra funding will be needed.
