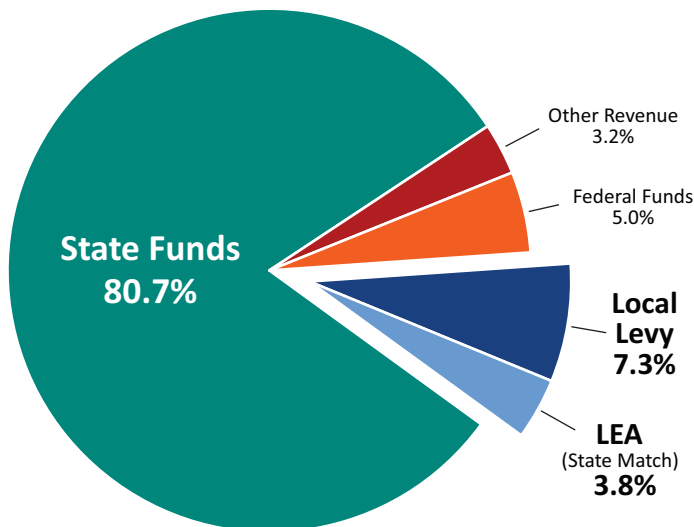
Central Valley voters will be asked to consider approval of a **supplemental levy**.



## students in every school benefit from each levy dollar

Over **11%** of the school district's annual budget comes from a voter-approved levy, including state matching funds.

An approved local levy brings state matching funds to CVSD through Local Effort Assistance (LEA), an additional \$7.37 million from the state.



## what does the levy pay for?

### special education programs

- ♦ Fills the gap left between program costs and state and federal funding

### student intervention and support programs

- ♦ Academic, social and emotional supports
- ♦ Systems to encourage positive behavior for a safe and orderly learning environment
- ♦ Programs for struggling or academically advanced students

### technology

- ♦ Many classroom devices are outdated, becoming unsupported and near the end of their life

### curriculum & instructional materials

- ♦ Textbooks and teaching materials

### co-curricular & extracurricular activities

- ♦ Music, drama, debate, athletics, STEM camps and after-school activities that keep students engaged in school

### staffing

- ♦ Teachers to maintain lower class sizes, nurses to meet students' basic health needs, counselors, social workers, security and support staff
- ♦ The state school funding model does not cover current staffing levels

### safety and security

- ♦ School resource deputies in our high schools
- ♦ School resource officers serving our elementary and middle schools
- ♦ Crossing guards, playground supervisors and hall monitors

## the levy sustains programs for engaging students and ensuring a safe learning environment

Exceptional levels of student achievement are directly tied to school programs paid for by the levy. To sustain these programs, a voter-approved School Programs & Operations supplemental levy is required.
